Lesson 1

- 3. Objectives: To learn about—
 - Israel's kings/divided kingdom.
 - Jeroboam king, northern Israel.Elijah tells King Ahab—No rain.
 - At brook, ravens feed Elijah.
 - Widow prepares his food.
 - Her son dies/Elijah raises him.

- Background Around 2,000 B.C., God called **Abram** to leave <u>Ur</u> of the <u>Chaldees</u>. He obeyed and went by **faith** to Canaan, the land God promised to him, to his son Isaac, and grandson Jacob.
- During their sojourn in <u>Canaan</u>, Jacob's son, **Joseph**, was sold as a <u>slave</u> to Egypt, but later, was <u>promoted second</u> to Pharaoh in all Egypt. Then his brothers and their families came to Egypt to live. After **Joseph's** death, all their descendants became Egyptian **slaves**. And God used **Moses** to miraculously bring Israel out of Egypt. At <u>Sinai</u>, God gave His law. And Moses led them through the wilderness.
- After Moses died, **Joshua** led Israel in <u>conquering Canaan</u>. Later, they began worshipping idols, and God allowed their <u>enemies</u> to <u>conquer</u> them.
- God then raised up **Judges**, such as <u>Gideon</u>, <u>Barak</u>, <u>Samson</u>, etc. to **deliver** them. Eventually, *"every man did that which was <u>right</u> in his* <u>own eyes</u>" <u>Judges 21:25</u>. The people then became so **corrupt**, they **refused** <u>God's rule</u> and <u>asked</u> for a **king** to <u>rule</u> over them.

Their first 3 kings-Saul, David, and Solomon each reigned 40 yrs.

King Solomon

During Solomon's reign, Israel controlled more territory, gained more

riches, and had more peace than at any time in Israel. Solomon also

built the magnificent **Temple.** But later, his love for many wives and

concubines brought God's judgment.

*Teacher reads, as class follows.

I Kings 11:9 And the LORD was angry with Solomon, because his heart was turned from the LORD <u>God of Israel</u>, which had appeared unto him twice.

God then stirred up adversaries against Solomon. A man named

Jeroboam, was told by a prophet of God that he would rule over 10

of Israel's 12 tribes. Solomon then sought to kill Jeroboam, but

Jeroboam fled to Egypt until after Solomon's death.

After Solomon died, his son Rehoboam reigned as King over Israel.

Jeroboam

When <u>Jeroboam</u> returned from Egypt, the 10 northern tribes followed him.

But Judah and Benjamin, the 2 southern tribes, stayed with King

Rehoboam. Jeroboam was very evil (Ch. 13), and God warned him,

but he did not turn from his evil way.

Kingdom divided

Thus, the nation Israel was divided. Jeroboam was king over the

10 northern tribes, which were called **Israel**. And <u>Rehoboam</u> reigned over the **2 southern** tribes called **Judah**.

Often, there **was** war between the two—the 10 northern tribes (Israel) and the 2 southern tribes (Judah). And they each had to <u>war</u> against other nations.

Ahab/Jezebel

Israel had more wicked kings reigning over them than Judah did. To

rebuke the wicked kings. God used His prophets. Later, a king

named Ahab began ruling over Israel's 10 tribes.

Teacher reads, as class follows.

- I Kings 16:30 And Ahab the son of Omri did evil in the sight of the LORD above all that were before him.
 - ³¹ And it came to pass, as if it had been a light thing for him to walk in the sins of Jeroboam the son of Nebat. that he took to wife Jezebel the daughter of Ethbaal king of the Zidonians, and went and served Baal, and worshipped him.
 - ³² And he reared up an altar for **Baal** in the house of Baal, which he had built in Samaria. 33 And Ahab made a grove; and Ahab did more to provoke the LORD God of Israel to anger than all the kings of Israel that were before him.

Ahab was more wicked then all the kings that ruled before him. He had

married Jezebel, the wicked daughter of the king of Sidon. Ahab

then erected an altar to an idol called Baal.

Prophecy fulfilled

In Ahab's days, the following occurred—

Teacher reads, as class follows.

Vs. 34 In his days did Hiel the Bethelite build Jericho: he laid the foundation thereof in Abiram his firstborn, and set up the gates thereof in his youngest son Segub, according to the word of the LORD, which he spake by **Joshua** the son of Nun.

This verse relates to a prophecy God made-after Joshua conquered

Jericho Josh. 6:26. It prophesied-whoever rebuilt Jericho would have

2 sons die in the process. This happened years later, at this time.

The man's oldest son **died** when Jericho's **foundation** was laid, and

his youngest son died when the city gates were set up. God's

prophecies always come to pass!

Elijah rebukes Ahab

Teacher reads, as class follows. 17:1 And Elijah the Tishbite, who was of the inhabitants of Gilead, said unto Ahab, As the LORD God of Israel liveth, before whom I stand, there shall **not** be **dew** nor **rain** these <u>years</u>, but according to **my word**.

It was perhaps a palace joke. Elijah knew God withholds rain when

nations continue in sin (Deu. 11:17 and I Kings 8:35). James 5:17 says-

"Elias was a man subject to like passions as we are, and he prayed

earnestly that it might **not rain:** and it rained not on the earth by the

space of three years and six months."

I John 5:15 says—"And if we know that he hear us, whatsoever we ask,

we know that we have the petitions that we desired of him."

God told Elijah—

*Teacher reads, as class follows.

Vs. 3 Get thee hence, and turn thee eastward, and hide thyself by the brook Cherith, that is Locate Cherith and before Jordan.

Jordan river 4 And it shall be, that thou shalt drink of the brook; and I have commanded the ravens to feed thee there.

- ⁵ So he went and did according unto the word of the LORD: for he went and dwelt by the brook Cherith. that is before Jordan.
- ⁶ And the **ravens** brought him bread and flesh in the morning, and bread and flesh in the evening; and he drank of the brook.

Elijah's home was Gilead (see map). Cherith means "cut off, separate."

There, God protected Elijah by "cutting him off" from others. He had

water from the brook Cherith, and ravens brought him bread and fish

mornings and evenings.

Widow to feed Elijah

Teacher reads, as class follows. 17:7 And it came to pass after a while, that the brook dried up, because there had been **no rain** in the land.

⁸ And the word of the LORD came unto him, saying, Locate Zarephath

⁹ Arise, get thee to <u>Zarephath</u>, which belongeth to **Zidon**, and dwell there: behold, I have **commanded** a <u>widow woman</u> there to <u>sustain</u> thee.

It is interesting that Zarephath was Jezebel's home

town-the least likely place to look for Elijah.

Thus, God's command guaranteed Elijah's

safety. The safest place to be is in the will of God, and the most

dangerous place is out of God's will.

★Teacher reads, as class follows.

- Vs. 10 So he arose and went to Zarephath. And when he came to the gate of the city, behold, the widow woman was there gathering of sticks: and he <u>called</u> to her, and said, <u>Fetch me</u>, I pray thee, a little water in a <u>vessel</u>, that I may drink.
 - ¹¹ And as she was going to fetch it, he called to her, and said, Bring me, I pray thee, a <u>morsel of</u> **bread** in thine <u>hand</u>.

This was the widow who would feed Elijah. Widows were usually poor, but

if God commanded ravens to bring Elijah food, He could command a

poor widow to give him food.

God arranged the timing of Elijah's arrival. As Elijah entered the city gate,

the widow and her son were there searching for sticks of wood. Elijah

called her-to bring him a little water in a vessel. As she went to get

water, he said, "Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand."

Little meal and oil

*Teacher reads, as class follows.
17:12 And she said, As the LORD thy <u>God liveth</u>, I have <u>not</u> a <u>cake</u>, but an <u>handful</u> of **meal** in a <u>barrel</u>, and a <u>little</u> **oil** in a <u>cruse</u>: and, behold, I am gathering two sticks, that I may go in and dress it <u>for me and my</u> <u>son</u>, that we may **eat** it, and **die**.

She said, "As the LORD thy God liveth." She, no doubt, believed in

Jehovah, for she recognized—Elijah's God was living. She

admitted her $\underline{poverty}$ and said—"I only have a handful of meal and

a little oil. I was getting sticks to make a fire and prepare for me and

my son to eat; then we will die."

"Make me cake first"

 *Teacher reads, as class follows.
 Vs. 13 And Elijah said unto her, Fear not; go and do as thou hast said: but make me thereof a <u>little cake</u> first, and bring it unto me, and after make for thee and for thy son.

Elijah said-make my cake (bread) first. He then tells her why-

★Teacher reads, as class follows.

- Vs. 14 For thus saith the LORD God of Israel, The barrel of meal shall not waste, neither shall the <u>cruse</u> of oil fail, until the day that the LORD sendeth rain upon the earth.
 - ¹⁵ And she went and **did** according to the saying of Elijah: and she, and he, and her house, did **eat** <u>many days</u>.
 - ¹⁶ And the barrel of **meal** <u>wasted not</u>, neither did the cruse of **oil fail**, according to the word of the LORD, which he spake by Elijah.

Because she made Elijah's food first, she and her son always had food.

Their dependence was on God, which is God's will for all His children.

Elijah told her God's promise-the meal would always be there, and


the oil would not stop, 'til God sent rain. Therefore, Elijah and the

widow practiced what Jesus said in-

A Key Verse

Key Verse 1

Matt. 6:34 Take therefore <u>no thought</u> for the <u>morrow</u>: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the <u>evil thereof</u>.



(repeat verse)

*Teacher reads, as class follows. **Vs. 17** And it came to pass after these things, that the **son** of the woman, the mistress of the house, fell **sick;** and his sickness was so sore, that there was **no breath** left in him.

Tragedy/son dies



- ¹⁸ And she said unto Elijah, What have I to do with thee, O thou man of God? art thou come unto me to call my sin to <u>remembrance</u>, and to slay my son?
- When her son became sick and stopped breathing, she called Elijah and

said, Are you come-to "call my sin to remembrance, and to slay my

son?" She immediately thought-it's my sin, and God is judging me.

Her conscience was very sensitive to personal guilt.

When tragedy comes, people often think-God is judging them for some

wrong they did in the past. This simply verifies-that God has put in

man's conscience—a sense of right and wrong.

Son raised to life

- *Teacher reads, as class follows.
 17:19 And he said unto her, Give me thy son. And he took him out of her bosom, and carried him up into a loft, where he abode, and laid him upon his own bed.
 - ²⁰ And he cried unto the LORD, and said, O LORD my God, hast thou also brought **evil** upon the **widow** with whom I sojourn, by **slaying** her **son?**
 - ²¹ And he <u>stretched himself</u> upon the child **three** <u>times</u>, and **cried** unto the LORD, and said, O LORD my God, I pray thee, let this **child's soul come** into him **again**.

Elijah picked up her son, <u>carried</u> him to his loft and <u>laid</u> him on his bed.

He prayed 3 times to God, and stretched himself over the young boy,

and cried, "Let this child's soul come into him again."

*Teacher reads, as class follows.

- Vs. 22 And the LORD <u>heard</u> the <u>voice</u> of Elijah; and the **soul** of the child **came** into him **again**, and he <u>revived</u>.
 - ²³ And Elijah took the child, and <u>brought</u> him <u>down out</u> of the **chamber** into the **house**, and delivered him unto his mother: and Elijah said, See, thy son **liveth**.
 - ²⁴ And the woman said to Elijah, Now by this I **know** that thou <u>art</u> a **man** of God, and that the <u>word</u> of the LORD <u>in thy mouth</u> is **truth**.

If the widow had any doubt, this convinced her that Elijah served the God

of truth and was a man of great faith. Because of that, God used him to do great miracles.

In our next study, Ahab will search diligently for Elijah. Later, they meet and each goes to Mt. Carmel. There, Elijah will have a **miraculous** display of **God's power.** Ahab and all the <u>evil prophets</u> of the **idol Baal** will see the power of <u>Israel's God</u>. Because of this, <u>many</u> in Israel will **turn** to the true <u>God</u>. And many living in heathen areas will also hear about the <u>great power</u> of Israel's God.

Why does God do such <u>miraculous</u> things? So people of all nations and all generations can know about His **great power** and **believe** on the <u>true</u> and **living God.**
